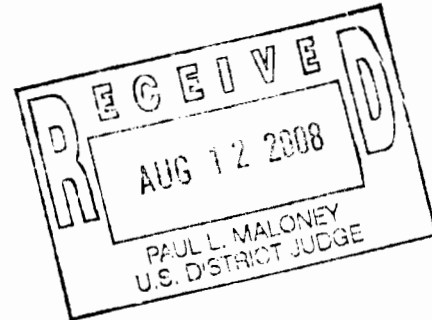

Dear Judge Maloney:

Once again I come before you with information I am presenting for appropriate application in this case. Again, I will let you make the decision. The Michigan Compiled Law that I cited in my Motion of Quash to the Honorable Court on March 4, 2008, MCL 338.821 known as the Private Detectives Licensing Act, has recently been Amended by the Michigan Legislature and re-titled as the "Professional Investigator Licensure Act" (Public Act 146 of 2008). I wish to bring to Your Honor's attention the amended law, and I wish to have it cited as an authority. Specifically I would wish the Court to recognize the Acts direct references to "Computer Forensic" in Section 2. Paragraph b, and the notation of exemptions in Section 2 Paragraph e, exempting only... **"An attorney admitted to practice in this state in performing his or her duties as an attorney at law."**

The amendment to Public Act 1965 PA 285, (**Public Act 146 of 2008**), spells out the intent of the State of Michigan's 94th Legislature to provide specifically an "Act to license and regulate professional investigators;" and an act ... "to protect the general public against unauthorized, unlicensed and unethical operations by professional investigators" ;. Governor Granholm signed Act No. 146 of the Public Acts of 2008, into law on May 28, 2008.

I have also discovered a copy of a letter issued by Detective David Pelletier of the Maine State Police, Special Investigations Unit to "MediaSentry" of Belcamp, MD, Dated April 10, 2008. This letter is similar to the Massachusetts State Police "Cease and Desist" order that the court used as a supplemental authority following the March 4 letter I sent to your office. In the letter to MediaSentry, Inc., Detective Pelletier explains, "that it would be illegal to continue acting in the capacity of a Private Investigator in Maine unless licensed." I am sure that the Recording Industry Lawyers were aware of this letter, but have again failed to bring it to Your Honor's attention. I have attached a copy of the letter to you for information. The letter is self-explanatory.

I present these documents to inform the Courts as to the intent of each states legislature and to demonstrate to the Court the similarities in Michigan's laws, and those of Massachusetts, Maine, North Carolina, New York, and Texas. Any exceptions that the recording industry's counsel or MediaSentry's counsel wishes to take up with these laws needs to be addressed to the individual states regulating agencies. Once again, I am not versed in the law, I am just a college student trying to get by, and I am trying to do this myself. Again, I hope that I am not overstepping my boundaries, and would beg Your Honor to consider the appropriate applications of the Act as the implied intent of the Michigan Legislature. I thank you for your time.
